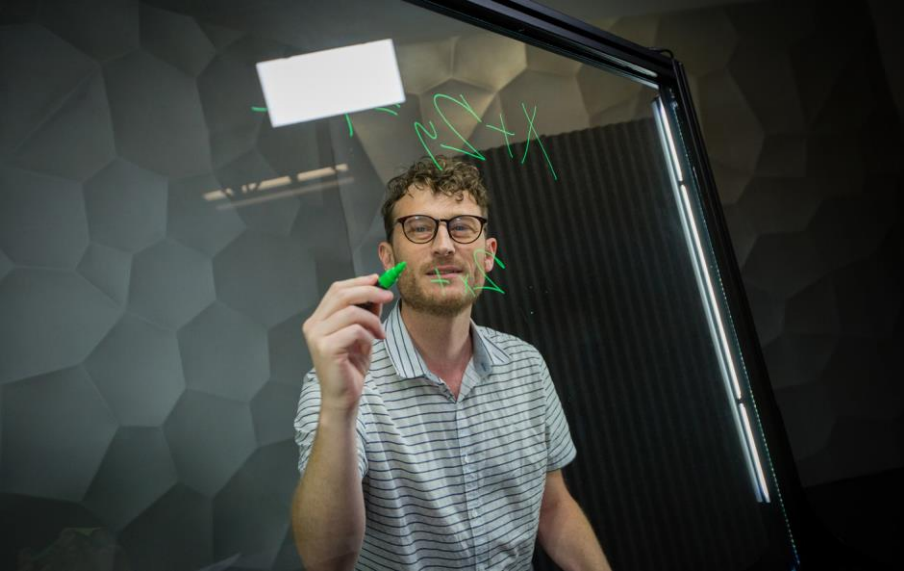

Position Summary

Reporting to the Head of Information Services, the Nursing Informationist builds partnerships with faculty, departments, and the School of Nursing to optimize the use of information for research, education, and patient care. To this end, the informationist identifies information needs of students, faculty, and staff in the School of Nursing. In response to these needs, the informationist 1) delivers in-depth reference, research and consultation services, 2) designs and provides instruction, 3) supports university research by participating in the systematic review team, 4) creates information products, digital tools, and services to enable users to locate, organize, and use information, and 5) identifies and recommends information resources for the library collection. In support of the greater user community of the library, the Nursing Informationist participates in the reference service by responding to requests from the Information Desk and the electronic on-demand reference service.



Professional Responsibilities

- Participate in professional and scholarly associations; maintain membership and accreditation; participate in meetings, conferences, and workshops; serve in appointed or elected positions.
- Maintain up-to-date professional knowledge and skills related to job responsibilities and current trends in higher education, academic libraries, and information technology.
- Adhere to guidelines in the Emory Handbook Governing the Librarian series for Faculty-Equivalent Librarians regarding appointment, renewal, and promotion.
- Participate in library and campus committees.

Essential Responsibilities & Duties

Reference and Research Assistance

- Responds to requests for mediated searches and in-depth reference requests using a variety of biomedical and social science databases and other specialized resources; delivers results in format appropriate for the user (focused search, saved search, descriptive report, EndNote library, etc.).
- Participates in providing reference service by responding to requests from the Information Desk and the electronic on-demand reference service (AskUs). Serves as a backup to Information Desk staff when they receive reference inquiries.
- Participates in systematic review services by designing reproducible literature searches and collaborating on data management and manuscript preparation.
- Consults with students, academic staff, and faculty through scheduled appointments to identify sources, develop research strategies, or review information management.
- Collaborates with clinical informationists to provide services to nurses and other practitioners at Emory Healthcare locations.
- Collaborates with other informationists to develop information products, digital tools, and services to facilitate on-demand use of information.

Instruction and Outreach

- Identifies information needs and maintains outreach to faculty, academic staff, and students in the School of Nursing. Cultivates opportunities for collaboration with individual faculty and departments within the School of Nursing.
- Using a variety of technologies, develops and delivers instruction to build information processing competencies both within the School of Nursing and among curriculum and to enable students, faculty, and academic staff to be self-sufficient in their information seeking.
- Communicates regularly with department faculty, students, and academic staff to promote library resources, services, and events.
- Contributes and maintains content for the library website and blogs to support access to and use of information.

Collection Development

- Maintains awareness of the curricular needs, teaching approaches, and research interests of faculty in the School of Nursing and makes recommendations to support those activities; identifies collection gaps based on requests received via reference requests, consultation, AskUs, research meetings, and listservs.
- Reviews and selects materials from profile plan.
- Manages library collections through participating in collection development review projects such as weeding the nursing collection.
- Contributes to content discovery by creating research guides relevant to subject areas.

- Master's degree in Library and Information Science (ALA-accredited) or equivalent education and experience.
- Demonstrated expertise in nursing information resources and evidence-based practice.
- Strong collaboration and communication skills with faculty, students, and healthcare professionals.
- Proficiency with library technologies, research tools, and standard office applications

- Five years of experience in a health sciences or academic medical library.
- Experience providing instruction and research support in health sciences or nursing.
- Familiarity with systematic review methodologies and related tools.
- Knowledge of current trends in academic health sciences libraries and nursing education.
- Active engagement in professional associations or scholarly activities.

- 3) **On a separate document list the names, email addresses, and telephone numbers of 3 professional references** including a current or previous supervisor.

Candidates applying by April 2, 2026, will receive priority consideration.

General Information

Professional librarians at Emory Libraries are 12-month faculty-equivalent positions evaluated annually with assigned ranks renewable for 3 or 5 years based on experience and background. Appropriate professional leave and funding is provided. Depending on educational credentials and position, librarians may be considered for a shared/dual appointment between the library and academic department as a faculty member.

Librarian appointees at Emory generally have educational credentials and professional backgrounds with academic library experience and/or disciplinary knowledge and demonstrate a commitment to continuous learning, professional engagement and involvement, research and scholarship, creativity, innovation, and flexibility. Such backgrounds will normally include a graduate degree from an ALA-accredited library and information science program AND/OR a discipline-specific master's OR doctoral degree. In addition to professional competence and service within the library in the primary job assignment, advancement and/or appointment renewal requires professional involvement and contributions outside of the library and scholarly activities. Candidates must show evidence or promise of such contributions.

Emory Libraries staff, including student workers, number approximately 350 with an overall library budget of approximately \$42 million.
