Inauguration poet Richard Blanco's papers now at Rose Library

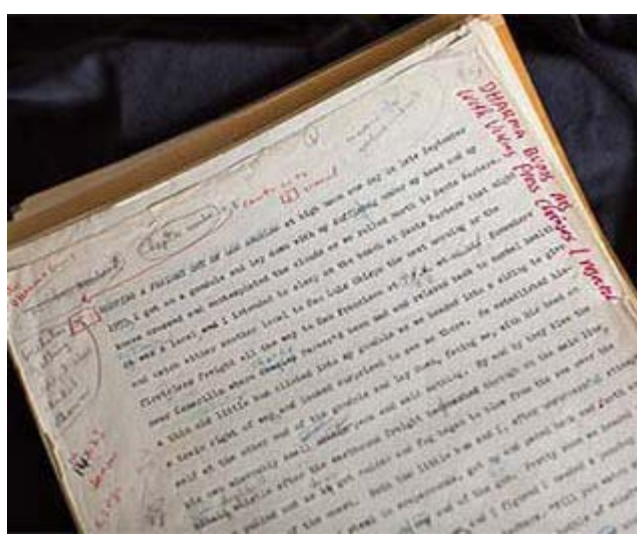
Richard Blanco, who presented his poem, "One Today," at the second inauguration of President Barack Obama in 2013, has placed his papers with the Stuart A. Rose Manuscript, Archives, and Rare Book Library.

The archive includes drafts of three possible inauguration poems, unpublished works, letters from the Obamas, and correspondence with other authors and poets.

Blanco, who has visited Emory twice as a guest of the Spanish and Portuguese department, became the first Latino, immigrant, and openly gay poet to read at a U.S. presidential inauguration.

New digital collections added in time for Women's History Month

We recently added several digital collections to the Emory Libraries in the areas of politics, history, sociology, and gender studies.

The magazine archives include access to articles from Newsweek (beginning in 1933) and several women's magazines that still publish today, such as Good Housekeeping and Ladies Home Journal, both dating back to the 1880s.

Another significant addition, previously on microfilm only: primary materials on voting rights, national politics, and reproductive rights from the Schlesinger Library at Harvard's Radcliffe Institute, via ProQuest's History Vault.

The collections are accessible to current Emory students, faculty, and staff with an active Emory ID and password.

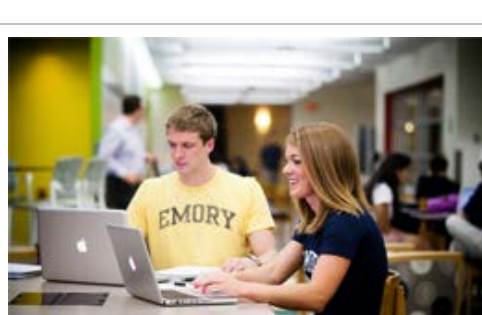
